
# FACT SHEET: EnergyFit Nevada

January 2013

The Energy Office received a three-year, \$5 million Department of Energy grant in 2010 for EnergyFit Nevada (EFN), a program aimed at increasing comfort and energy savings in Nevadan's homes while reducing energy consumption. In addition to rebates based on increases in energy efficiency, low-interest loans are available to fund recommended upgrades. The program's goal is to upgrade 1,250 single family residences in Nevada by October 2013.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- EnergyFit Nevada has leveraged community organizations to encourage different market entry points for a broader reach: Green Chips, Clean Energy Project, Nevada Conservation League, Workforce Connections, Homeowners Associations, Nevada Rural Electric Association and many others
- Marketing research was conducted to best target potential homeowners who would be interested in making their homes more energy efficient

EFN developed a low-interest loan program with Nevada State Bank for homeowners to assist in financing upgrades at a 2.3% interest rate

- Governor Brian Sandoval, the City of Reno, City of Henderson, City of Las Vegas, City of Sparks and Washoe County have made proclamations for EnergyFit Nevada Day
- More than 185 homes have completed home-energy efficiency upgrades
- 250 more homeowners have requested an assessment or are in the process of upgrading their homes
- The cost to homeowners for the assessment and upgrade averages between \$1,500–4,000
- Rebates to homeowners average about \$2,000
- Average energy savings for each home is between 20–30%.
